**FROM IDEA TO SCREEN: The Creative, Business and Legal Aspects
of Theatrical Motion Picture Production as They Apply in Particular to
African American Filmmakers
Spring Quarter 1993-1994**

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I. **DESCRIPTION OF COURSE:** This course covers the creative, business and legal issues, from a theoretical and practical standpoint, that are confronted by filmmakers, particularly African-American filmmakers, when filmmakers venture to turn an idea into a theatrical motion picture. Specifically, this course will examine the creative process of developing ideas into saleable script form, getting a movie deal and the production, distribution and marketing of movies, as well as the financial rewards derived from the same.
